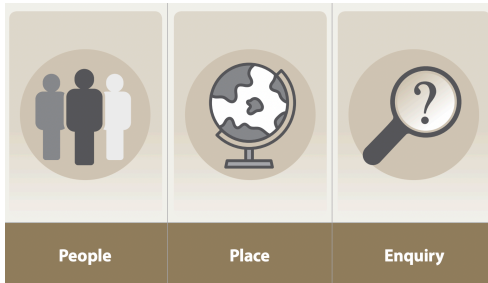


What would it be like to explore the UK's tallest mountain?

Five Facts About Ben Nevis

- Ben Nevis is the tallest mountain in the United Kingdom. Its peak is over 4,000 feet above sea level.
- Ben Nevis stands in the western end of the Grampian Mountains in Scotland.
- Ben Nevis was once an active volcano.
- Over 100,000 walkers enjoy climbing Ben Nevis every year.
- The most popular route for ascending Ben Nevis is the Pony Track (also known as the Ben Path or the Tourist Route).

Geography terminology

 population	For example, the number of people living in one place.
 land use	What the land is used for. For example, in the countryside or in a city.
 region	An area that has clear characteristics but doesn't always have fixed boundaries.
 OS map	These are detailed maps that contain a scale and grid references.
 key	On an OS map the key tells you what different symbols on the map mean.
 mountains	A large natural rise in the earth's surface. Mountains are like large steep hills.
 density	For example, to talk about the number of things found in one area - people, plants, animals, etc.
