Galmpton narrowly missed out on winning the tournament, a testament to their weekly lessons and support of parents.</li> <li>Also in Summer 1 Year 2 and Year 3 pupils represented the school in a tag rugby game. This was arranged to commemorate Brixham Rugby Club's 150 year anniversary. The children played really well and showed many of our character values.</li> <li>Last July Galmpton came 2<sup>nd</sup> in the ACE Olympics and were only beaten by one of the 17 schools who were twice our size. A great achievement from our Y2-Y6 pupils who showed great character throughout.</li> </ul>	from increased competitive games is sustained, increase the range of sports to include swimming.
